Storyteller Mary Jane Bradbury has 25 years experience as a speaker, educator and actor. She is a Chautauqua speaker for Colorado Humanities and an artist/educator for Think360 Arts in Education. She offers a variety of historic character portrayals as well as workshops and residencies designed to teach participants of all ages the techniques and value of bringing history alive through storytelling. Ms. Bradbury is an interpretive enactor for the Denver Museum of Nature and Science. She worked with temporary exhibits *Ben Franklin: In Search of a Better World* and *Titanic: The Artifact Exhibit*, and helped develop the museum's current enactment program, interpreting historic aspects of natural history and modern science for permanent exhibits and educational programs. She has developed interpretive programs and events for area museums celebrating Colorado's pioneer history. A commercial and industrial film actor and spokesperson, Ms. Bradbury has spent time on the other side of the camera, producing a college study skills telecourse for Prentice Hall, and has co-authored texts on study skills and curriculum majors.
